

Looking back on 10 years





It's hard to believe it's been 10 years since we established our Heart of the Community Fund with the aim of giving back to our communities.

"We'd been supporting local causes long before that but saw the Fund as a way of bringing more structure and strategic focus to this support.

"Keen that we channel our resources where they would be of most benefit, we knew exactly who to ask: our communities themselves. People who live and work in the areas in which we farm and who know first-hand the issues that living in such remote, if beautiful, locations can bring.

"People who recognise sports clubs, for example, as a means of providing younger generations with the same opportunities as those living more centrally, helping guard against depopulation.

"People who understand that a simple playpark ensures there are affordable activities for local families of all incomes and that mother and toddler clubs can help guard against feelings of isolation.

"I could go on. Instead, I'll let this anniversary brochure do the talking. Packed with highlights from the Fund's first 10 years, it's a celebration of the great work going on in our communities, by our communities.

12 local causes shared in awards totalling £35,886.

From building a new pontoon and helping towards the costs of athletics, curling and football clubs, to providing safe spaces and activities for mothers and toddlers and contributing to the cost of dementia care – the diversity of good work going on in our local communities quickly became apparent.

And one grant in particular helped establish Heart of the Community as an initiative keen to help where it was needed most: the donation of iPads to the elderly residents of Smiddybrae House in Orkney, helping them stay connected with family and friends.



In the initial years, responsibility for the new Fund rested with Scottish Sea Farms' sales team who, in tandem with colleagues around our farming regions, worked hard to raise awareness of the support available and who oversaw the early applications. Then, in 2013, sales colleague Georgie Mackenzie was appointed Heart of the Community Coordinator, providing applicants with one single point of contact and helping the wider team spread the word via adverts, posters, visits, regional roadshows and BBQs.

Smallest single grant



£50 was the smallest grant given, requested by Mallaig Primary School to help fund an outward bound course for its seven pupils.

Largest single grant



£20k is the largest amount given in one single grant, first awarded to Appin Community Trust in 2012 to fund the landscaping of a much-used community car park.

Most commonly requested



£5K is the amount most commonly applied for in grant applications, followed by £2K.

Farm Managers' £500 grants

In 2013, we introduced a new policy whereby every Farm Manager was allocated £500 annually to give to the local cause of their choosing.

To date, it's added up to a **£59,300** boost, shared across a wide range of community activities: from foodbanks, junior football and festivals to mental health support, Christmas present appeals and cancer charities.




Regional breakdown
